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**Odyssee 4. 355-389**  
**A Papyrus from the Michigan Collection<sup>1</sup>**

P.Mich.inv. 3390

6.9 x 14.7 cm.

1st half of II A.D.

This papyrus preserves the left margin of lines 355-389 of book 4 of the Odyssey. The original format was probably that of a scroll, as appears likely from the absence of writing on the back.<sup>2</sup> Two interesting features of this piece are the hand in which it is written, and the apparent variant of the text in line 23 (377); the text displays no other variants from the vulgate. The hand is an informal, almost documentary hand which admits cursive forms, such as the ligature of alpha and iota in εὐρέμεναι in line 20 (374). The closest parallel known to me is P.Lond.inv. 115 of the first half of the second century A.D., to which period we should probably assign the present text.<sup>3</sup>

In line 23, where κ[ατερύκομαι is expected, the papyrus reads ε[. No variant is attested anywhere for this line. Most likely, this is a scribal mistake, such as, e.g., the simplex form of the verb for the compound, probably inspired by ἐρύκεαι in line 19 (373).

The text displays no accents, breathings, or punctuation. Opposite line 28 (382) there is an oblique stroke, perhaps indicating a new section. My transcript follows the usual practice of editors of Homeric papyri and introduces only word division and capitalization of proper names.
