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## What's in a Name? The Gerontii of the Later Roman Empire.

Original prosopographical research involves the laborious creation of files of individuals and their citations. When published, the most ambitious collections appear in encyclopedic form reminiscent of modern-day telephone books: the *MRR*, *PIR*, *PLRE* and recently, the *CLRE*.<sup>1</sup> The value of such industry to the student of Roman history is admittedly very important; yet, such dense reference materials do have their limitations. Favoring broad coverage they tend to focus upon better-documented individuals of status to the exclusion of others. If, however, one wishes to undertake an onomastic study of any one *cognomen*, these collections and others offer a good place to start;<sup>2</sup> but due to obvious practical limitations, such resources represent only the tip of a vast, submerged iceberg. Consequently, this onomastic investigation has ranged far and wide in its search for the Gerontii of the Later Roman Empire. It confronts the issues of origin, derivation and significance, status, chronology, spatial distributions, corruptions and variant-forms.

Appendices, bibliography and distribution charts follow.<sup>3</sup>

Names, so intimately bound to the individuals and families that proudly carried them, can themselves provide a history of sorts. In the case of the Gerontii, the date and locale of their earliest attestation present somewhat of a problem. Perhaps the *cognomen*'s earliest appearance in the East can be documented in a late second century Mithraic dedicatory inscription from Sidon (E 19) and also in several Egyptian papyri and ostraka of the second (E 30, 202, 215) and third (E 1-2, 31-33, 203) centuries. Meanwhile in the West, the earliest mention of this *cognomen* is tied to a tradition surrounding the works and martyrdom of an Early Christian bishop of Spain that dates to perhaps the first century (W 97); otherwise, several inscriptions, broadly assigned to the second and third centuries (W 9, 22, 108), tend to support a mid- to late-second century *terminus post quem* for the invention of the *cognomen*; a period

when new name creations, especially with an *-ιος*, *-τια*, or *-ιούς*, *-ια* suffix, were frequently in the making.<sup>4</sup> Regardless of where the *cognomen* originated, in either the Eastern or Western half of the Empire, by the mid- to late third century, it had reached acceptance in both (Unkn. 1, 2).

The derivation and early significance of the *cognomen* were once uncertain.<sup>5</sup> Latinized forms, *Gerontius-ia*, at first glance seemed to have been derived from the verb *gerō* (W 9), to carry, bear or shoulder work or duties, all of which could conceivably range from child-bearing to public administration. Better, however, is a Greek origin for the name based upon the stem γέρων- (Kajanto, *Onomastic Studies* 85), which not only has obvious geriatric connotations (γερόντειος), but also implies membership in a Greek γερουσία—council of elders or senate. The early significance of this *cognomen* thus connoted status through a matrix of potentially honorable meanings: aged respect, wisdom of experience, responsibility and perhaps even political clout. The equation *senator* = γερόντιος, therefore, seems here appropriate. Over time and especially during the Christianization of the Empire during fourth and fifth centuries, however, this early significance may have become blurred. Within the Early Christian mindset of spirituality, humility, and asceticism, the *cognomen*'s significance may have transmuted into an apotropaic desire to insure that a fragile, newborn's characteristics would include the maturity and wisdom of old age. Perhaps the modern proverb — so old, so smart, is appropriate in this context.

Information pertinent to status, chronology and perhaps the religious persuasion of individuals can be gleaned from a close examination of how a *cognomen* was employed. For the Gerontii, their attestations represent all strata of Late Roman society,<sup>6</sup> the civil administration,<sup>7</sup> military,<sup>8</sup> and Christian church<sup>9</sup> — the sole exception being the Imperial family. Among free

males of status or military rank the classical nomenclature of the full *tria nomina* formula: *praenomen*, *nomen* and *cognomen* complete with the optional ancestral filiations (*filius*) and *n(epos)*, remained *de rigueur* in formal and ceremonial inscriptions until the end of the fourth century.<sup>10</sup> As early as the late second century, however, this fulsome formula no longer was used in common practice; the *praenomina* and their abbreviations were the first to disappear almost entirely.<sup>11</sup> What remained as indicators of status was a system based principally upon the *nomen*, *cognomen*, and filiation (E 6a i-ii, 7-12, 14-18, 22-24. W 5). Moreover, from the late second century onwards, those of a particular status or military rank oftentimes adopted recognized *nomina* popularized by the Imperial families that bore them. In this regard, Keenan's thesis that one's adopted *nomen* dictated one's status and chronological framework finds confirmation among the Gerontii,<sup>12</sup> for example, among the Aurelii (E 1-18. W 2-3. Unkn. 1), Valerii (E 27-28) and Flavii (E 19-26). Lesser known *nomina*, such as Cautilii (W 4, 106), Licinii (W 5), and also perhaps Tannonii (W 6), appear with the *cognomen*. Other Gerontii provide several variations of an abbreviated nomenclature. For example, instances exist of double *cognomina* (E 205, W 1, 108-110), and recognized *nomen* followed or surrounded by two *cognomina* (E 108).

Far more common by the fourth century and thereafter was the tendency towards the simplification of the traditional *tria nomina* to that of a mere *cognomen* with the addition of familial,<sup>13</sup> titular (see note 6 above), or even occupational appendages.<sup>14</sup> This trend in abbreviated nomenclature has been attributed to a combination of scribal expediency and the influences of Christianity.<sup>15</sup>

Although there are more attestations for the Gerontii in the Eastern than Western half of the Empire (Charts A-C), it does not necessarily follow that this spatial distribution was so in Late Antiquity; for such an inference must be tempered by the skewing factors of survival, content, and the provenience of the evidence itself. For example, in the East Egyptian papyri predominate while cemetery inscriptions, especially from Rome, do likewise in the West. Moreover, the subject matter of a bureaucratic papyrus fragment will be considerably different from that of a formal cemetery inscription. Further, one's religious persuasion is not usually

the central subject of nor apparent in that fragmentary papyrus, while its affirmation becomes practically a formulaic necessity in a Christian cemetery inscription.<sup>16</sup> Therefore to state, as one scholar has,<sup>17</sup> that the Gerontii were common among the Christians of Italy and the Western Empire, is true enough. What has not been pointed out, however, is that the same can be said for Egypt and the Eastern Empire as well.

Philologically interesting are the many variant forms of a *cognomen*, providing as they do windows into the development and tonal qualities of an ancient language. In this regard the Gerontii do not disappoint, offering several examples, although admittedly some of the variants discussed below are more the product of corruption than linguistic evolution. For example, among many Late Greek singular masculine nominatives that end in -ιος, a phenomenon known as vowel syncope occurs in which the final ο drops out, as in Γερόντις (E 122a, 168b, 202-204; W 18-20).<sup>18</sup> An analogous situation occurs in Latin masculine nominatives ending in -ius, in which the u is dropped, as in *Gerontis* (W 20-21).<sup>19</sup> Other orthographical variations occur especially in the case of vowels with the substitution of υ, ου and ω for ο,<sup>20</sup> all of which may well indicate that the sounds represented are those of the spoken language.<sup>21</sup> For example, Γερύντιος (E 207-208; Unkn. 15-16), *Geruntius* (W 97-103, Unkn. 17), Γερούντιος (E 206) and Γερώντιος (E 209-211),<sup>22</sup> all reveal variations in either real or perceived vowel emphasis. A interesting combination of the above vocalic phenomena involves both a substitution from ι to η plus the loss of an ο through vowel syncope, as in Κερόντης (E 214).<sup>23</sup> Meanwhile instances of consonantal loss and interchange can also be observed. For example, the loss of medial dental and nasal consonants are attested, as in *Geronius* (W 10 (?), 11-12), *Gerotia* (W 138; variant of *Cerotia* or *Gerosia*?) and *Gerotius* (W 96).<sup>24</sup> Me-

dial consonantal interchanges occur between the voiceless dental stop τ and voiced dentals δ and c, as in Κερόνδιοc (E 213, with metathesis of the voiced and voiceless sound) and *Geronsia* (W 113).<sup>25</sup> Elsewhere, initial γ, a voiced velar consonant, is transformed into a κ, a voiceless velar stop, as in Κερόνδιοc (E 213, see above), Κερόντιοc (E 215? 216, perhaps in assimilation to the following stop) and Κερόντηc (E 214, possibly with the same assimilation).<sup>26</sup> Similarly in Latin inscriptions, the initial g is interchanged with either a c, a voiceless velar stop, or even an h, a simple breathing, as in *Cerontio* (W 7; diminutive form of *Cerontius/Cerontia*), *Cerunto* (W 8; diminutive form of *Ceruntius/Ceruntia*), *Ceruntia* (W 112) and *Hieruntius* (W 104). A close kin of the latter is Ἡρώντιc (E 212), which represents a combination of spirantization of *gamma* before, and affecting a vowel (γε > ji, with iotaism),<sup>27</sup> lengthening of vowels (above, substitution) and terminal vowel syncope. Another extreme case is that of *Cerunia* (W 111).<sup>28</sup> *Hieruntius* (W 104) asks for an analogical explanation. With its initial consonant, vocalic shift and loss of its medial dental, it perhaps should be considered as either a compound corruption of *Gerontia* or as a distant relative that has branched off to form an entirely new name.

In conclusion, several general observations can be made regarding the Gerontii. First, although the precise origin of the *cognomen* remains uncertain, it most likely was an Eastern creation whose early significance probably is best approximated by the equation: *senator* = γερόντιοc. Second, the Gerontii attested during the first eight centuries A.D. indicate that their spatial distribution was Empire-wide, even if Egypt and Italy provide the bulk of the evidence (Chart A). Consequently, the *cognomen* is not just a Western phenomenon, but a Eastern one as well. Third, regarding religious affiliation, the *cognomen* cannot be interpreted solely as a Christian tag. Rather, those who carried the *cognomen* during the second through third centuries in a *nomen + cognomen* context tend generally to be pagans, while after the third century the use of the *cognomen + filius* seems to have been common among Christians.<sup>29</sup> To date only one Jew is attested carrying this *cognomen* (Γερόντιc W 18). Fourth, during the fourth and subsequent centuries, the *cognomen* clearly became popular among Christians of the West. Meanwhile in the East, and in Egypt in particular, a similar phe

nomenon also may have been the case, but the subject matter of the papyri does not afford any insurance of the fact. In the end, only a cautious conjecture can be made based upon the Egyptians' traditional religiosity and that many had been converted to Christianity. Finally, the *cognomen's* many orthographical corruptions, variants and shifts in spelling may have provided the basis for new name creations.<sup>30</sup>




