## LITERARY SCHOOL EXERCISES

School exercises which represent the work of students and teachers in Graeco-Roman Egypt have remained in the grey area that lies between literary and documentary papyrology. So far they have never been thoroughly studied in their own right. In *Writing, Teachers, and Students in Graeco-Roman Egypt* (Atlanta 1996, no. 36 in *American Studies in Papyrology*) I attempt to remedy this deficiency. The book is based on a new Catalogue of school exercises that I compiled as a necessary prerequisite to an evaluation of work done in school and for school.<sup>1</sup> The Catalogue includes only exercises, since it is generally problematic to identify sufficient, objective marks distinguishing texts used in schools from texts circulating among the general public. As a rule, I did not take into account the exercises that originated in rhetorical schools, except a few that exhibit specific features that are common to other less advanced exercises. I also did not include Latin, mathematical, and advanced scribal exercises that presuppose specific notarial training or display professional “book hands”.

After the completion of the book it was suggested to me that an index to passages from literary works found in school exercises would be useful. It was not possible to add it to the book, but it is presented here. I am omitting not only the few exercises that have a documentary content but also students' and teachers' work at initial levels of education; that is, I am not considering alphabets and letters of the alphabet, syllabaries and lists of words. Since the extensive Catalogue at the end of the book groups exercises not by author but according to educational levels, and considers exercises that contain more than one author or text as singular items, it is a little cumbersome to identify in it all the exercises concerning a specific author or genre. Thus the list that appears below, organized by author and genre, makes it possible to use the material in the book more efficiently: the occurrence of a literary text as a school exercise can be determined by consulting the following list under a given author, or in the case of *adespota*, genre.

In this list the exercises are arranged in chronological order<sup>2</sup> according to their content, that is, a single exercise or notebook may appear several times if it has a composite content. The publication column only lists the most useful or accessible edition and not necessarily the *editio princeps*.<sup>3</sup> When applicable, a reference to the catalogue of Pack<sup>2</sup> is given.<sup>4</sup> The last column contains a reference to the specific number of each exercise in my Catalogue.<sup>5</sup> The series of *adespota* exercises is followed by a series of *adespota* that are distinguished by an asterisk, *adespota\**: I include in this category those exercises that may have not been based on a text that was circulating in antiquity, but most probably originated in a school context. I decided to include all grammatical exercises: while some of them present parts of grammatical handbooks, others contain only declensions or conjugations. I list under *Homeric* not only exercises such as *scholia minora* or *hypotheses* but also some exercises that may have been the exclusive product of school activity in composition.<sup>6</sup> Finally, I include under

*Testamentum* exercises that contain parts of the Old and New Testament, in order to show the new emphasis on religious texts that occurred in education from the third century AD onwards.

The process of selecting the exercises involved identification<sup>7</sup> of the following features: (1) types of textual material contained (e. g. sententiae), (2) writing materials (e. g. tablets) and their use, (3) distinguishing characteristics of an exercise (e.g. sudden interruption of the text), (4) mistakes and (5) evaluation of the hand. While the content of an exercise is in direct relation to the educational level of the student at an initial stage, when one confronts extensive passages of prose and verse diverse criteria must come into play. It is essential to try to ascertain when and under what conditions a particular writing material is *per se* a sufficient guarantee that something was written in a school context.<sup>8</sup> Setting out the distinguishing features of exercises is also of fundamental relevance.<sup>9</sup> Some special features, moreover, elucidate how students worked and learned, and how teachers taught reading and writing. An examination of the mistakes occurring in an exercise and a correct evaluation of their diverse import is also crucial. Most important, the identification of the exercises must be based on a direct evaluation of the hands of students and teachers.
